

Sample Legislator Bio

- New legislator assigned to the education committee, among others.
- Retired after a 35-year career in insurance. No background in education, government or policy.
- Passionate about education, but aside from attending school events for his children and grandchildren, he has little exposure to schools and education policy.



Sample GEPA Bio

- Has worked as a governor's education policy advisor for about 1.5 years.
- Early 30s and has worked in politics and policy for entire career.
- Role as a policy advisor to the governor requires them to quickly learn about many different issues.
- Strong understanding of the political landscape, if not education policy.



Sample State Board of Education Member Bio

- State board of education member for four years. Previously served as a local school board member and on various state-level committees and task forces.
- Retired educator and school administrator with a strong record in school turnaround.
- Developed a strong understanding of how local, state and federal education policies interact.



Sample Governor Bio

- Governor nearing the end of first term.
- Served several terms in the legislature and was successful in business.
- Education has been a top priority.
 Understands the education policy landscape, but lacks a strong grasp of specific issues.
- Has political aspirations and is keenly aware of the economic/political importance of education in those plans.



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State Policy Examples



Colorado, SB 18-085

- Expands stipends available to rural district teachers seeking national board certification.
- Extends stipends to teachers seeking alternative licensure, concurrent enrollment certification, special services certification.



State Policy Examples



Utah, HB 327

- Pilot program expands stipends available to individuals in rural areas to take advantage of job and business opportunities available online.
- Directs the administering university to provide training to and coordinate with rural high schools.

State Policy Proposals That Recognize Rural Needs

As the ever-increasing focus on equity in education grows, state policymakers are inevitably faced with pressures to better understand which students are still being left out. Given the relative locality and duty of state legislators to serve their constituents, discussions about P-20 education for rural students proves to be a trending topic among policymakers.

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Rural priorities are different from urban priorities, and policy solutions should be focused accordingly. While policy solutions should respond to the nuanced experiences of different student populations and communities' needs, there are some overarching themes that have, and continue, to plague many rural districts — including:

- Low college enrollment and completion.
- Lack of adequate **broadband connectivity** and the impacts on education.
- Finding qualified instructors to teach dual credit courses.





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
